MISSION

To provide health promotion and supportive care services to communities in British Columbia. A future where seniors live independently in their own homes.

VISION

The Health and Home Care Society of BC (Care BC) has completed another year of service to the community, part of our long history which stretches back to 1898. Though we have faced many challenges throughout our 125 years - most recently the global COVID-19 pandemic – we continue to adapt and evolve to meet the needs of the communities we serve. As always, we would like to acknowledge and express our gratitude to our volunteers and supporters who have helped us provide these essential services.

MEALS ON WHEELS (MOW)

Care BC continues to operate three MOW programs – Western and Chinese meals delivered in Vancouver and Richmond (since 1967 and 1996 respectively), and Western meals serving the North Shore. Care BC assumed responsibility for the North Shore MOW program in 2021, which had been operating since 1978.

Between April 1, 2022 and March 31, 2023, our MOW volunteers delivered over 145,000 meals to isolated and homebound seniors. 58% of our clients are aged 80 or older, and 59% live alone.

CARE BC VOLUNTEERS

Care BC has more than 450 volunteers who support our charitable programming, mostly through our Meals on Wheels programs. On average, we have over 90 volunteers helping per delivery day. In the last year, our volunteers contributed more than 43,000 hours of their time to our Meals on Wheels programs. We would not be able to reach as many clients as we do without their dedication.

We also thank the volunteers who support our Family Respite Centre, as well as the Care BC Board of Directors who volunteer their time to serve.

COMMUNITY INTEGRATION PROJECT (CIP)

The CIP supports individuals with newly acquired disabilities transition from rehabilitation back to their community by providing temporary housing within two fully-accessible apartments at St. George's Place (near VGH). In 2018 the Individualized Funding Resource Centre Society (IFRC Society) assumed operations of the program.

Each CIP unit at St. George's Place is available for up to 6 months. The program served 3 individuals this year. Since 1999, a total of 103 individuals - as well as some of their family members - have been supported by the CIP.

FAMILY RESPITE CENTRES (FRC)



Since 2002, Care BC's FRC in Vancouver has offered temporary care for seniors and individuals diagnosed with cognitive or physical impairment, allowing their caregivers to get a much-needed break from their 24/7 responsibilities. In the previous year, we served approx. 350 families through our Adult Day and Overnight Programs.


Planning for the development of a new FRC on the North Shore continues. In Oct. 2021 the City of North Vancouver council unanimously voted to rezone the 200 block of East Second Street to become a new "community hub". Phase one

includes the development of a FRC on the ground floor of the building which will also include 89 new housing units. Detailed planning has now been completed by Care BC in consultation with the Catalyst Community Developments Society and the City of North Vancouver. It is anticipated construction will begin later this year and be completed 22–24 months later. Care BC's Foundation has raised \$7 million of the \$11 million required to build the new FRC. The capital campaign is ongoing. Donations will be gratefully received by the Foundation.

Care BC is able to serve the people we do each year because of the help we receive from our community of supporters including our dedicated volunteers who interact directly with clients, and our loyal donors who keep our charitable programming viable through donations to the Health and Home Care Foundation of BC (the fundraising arm of Care BC). We also wish to recognize our volunteer Board of Directors for their governance and thank our staff who have worked tirelessly to maintain our services this year.

Care BC would also like to acknowledge the significant support we receive from Vancouver Coastal Health, Fair Haven Homes Society, the Vancouver Foundation and St. George's Place Society. These contributions, combined with financial assistance from the Province of British Columbia, including a Community Gaming Grant, as well as other generous Foundations - enabled us to provide invaluable community services to people in need.
