
Care BC has completed another successful year of service to the community since our founding in 1898. Throughout our 120 year history, we have continued our work towards our mission, providing health promotion and supportive care services to British Columbians through our charitable programs - Meals on Wheels (serving Vancouver and Richmond), the Family Respite Centre, and the Community Integration Project. With help from our community of volunteers, supporters, donors and staff members, we continue to strive towards our vision: A future where seniors live independently in their own homes.

The 2017-2018 fiscal year was a significant year for our Western Meals on Wheels program, which celebrated its 50th Anniversary in the fall of 2017. The Meals on Wheels program in Vancouver was launched in Canada's Centennial year, as Canadians were encouraged to improve their communities. Over 400 guests attended our Dinner & Dance Celebration at the Westin Bayshore Hotel and Resort, agreeing that the impact of the program is immense for seniors and others who may be homebound. Thanks to our sponsors, donors, supporters, volunteers and staff members, the evening was a record-breaking success, raising over \$200,000 in net revenues to support the program as it begins the next 50 years of service to the community.

The success of the past year was tempered with some disappointing developments; our Health Promotions Services (HPS) department discontinued its services this year. The program had been operating as a "social enterprise", offering health and well-being services to businesses to keep their employees healthy, with the proceeds benefitting our charitable programs. However, after 20 years the program faced increasing competition (primarily from pharmacies) and was no longer profitable. Care BC would like to acknowledge and thank our former clients for their business and extends our gratitude to the highly professional Registered Nurses who administered these HPS programs.

While celebrating the successes of the Meals on Wheels program and paying homage to our HPS department, we also face new challenges on the horizon. Our goal to build a second Family Respite Centre on the North Shore continues to develop. Although there are still quite a few hurdles to clear (from finalizing applications and permitting, to licensing and raising funds), we are excited at the opportunity. We will continue to share developments as the plans progress.

Our impact on the community would be greatly diminished without the support of Care BC's outstanding staff and our network of loyal volunteers and donors – to whom we express our deepest gratitude. Care BC also acknowledges the significant support we receive from the Vancouver Coastal Health Authority, the Fair Haven Homes Society, the Vancouver Foundation and St. George's Place Society. Combined with financial assistance from the Province of British Columbia, these contributions enabled us to provide invaluable services to people in need across the province.

Care BC 2017-2018 Program Highlights

Meals on Wheels (MOW)

For people confined to their home by illness or frailty, a hot meal and human contact can otherwise feel out of reach. Our network of over 350 Western and Chinese MOW volunteers delivered over 125,000 meals last year to 1,245 clients, also providing a brief friendly visit and informal safety check on the recipient. Fifty-nine percent (59%) of our meal recipients report living alone and fourteen percent (14%) are over 90 years old.

Care BC's **Meals on Wheels** (MOW) program has operated in Vancouver since 1967, and celebrated its 50th Anniversary in the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Family Respite Centre (FRC)

Care BC's **Family Respite Centre (FRC)** provides short–term respite care for families in need of a break from caregiver responsibilities. When caregivers have time to take care of themselves, they are able to continue their compassionate care for their loved one in their own home, thereby mitigating the effects of caregiver burnout.

The FRC, a custom-designed, homelike environment, opened at its current location in 2002. Seniors with cognitive decline and/or physical frailties receive care from our dedicated Nursing Team through our Adult Day Program or Overnight Respite Program as well as culturally appropriate recreational and therapeutic activities. Last year the FRC served over 325 families, most of whom returned more than once throughout the year.

Community Integration Project (CIP)

The **Community Integration Project (CIP)**, operated by Care BC since 2000, helps people facing unexpected physical disabilities and/or acquired brain injuries by providing accessible, affordable housing and assistance coordinating transitional support. The program has helped 87 individuals and their families find appropriate places to live enhancing their reintegration to their communities. Tenants can stay with a family member, if they choose, in one of two specially designed and equipped apartments at St. George's Place in Vancouver, conveniently located near the GF Strong Rehabilitation Centre.

The CIP allows people to leave the hospital earlier, surrounded by family and friends, offering support during a transitional time.



The Health and Home Care Society of BC (Care BC, or "the Society") is an independent, BC-based not-for-profit organization. Since 1898, Care BC has been caring for British Columbians with targeted health care initiatives. Care BC was one of the founding branches of the Victorian Order of Nurses (VON) as the BC branch. When VON Canada restructured as a national entity in 2006, Care BC opted to become an independent organization, adopting our current name at that time.


