PHARMACYBC

PharmacyBC is a group of pharmacists from The Medicine Shoppe working together to bring "Affordable Health Care to Your Door". With delivery direct to the door, medication ingestion can be witnessed and monitored.

Renee Lodge, Director of Pharmacy Services for PharmacyBC, recalled a phone call from a woman whose parents received medication deliveries.

with The Medicine Shoppe Their Home last spring. Health Case Manager had suggested to the daughter that she call us to daily dispense her parents' medications as the parents were not succeeding at trying to stay in their home and look after one another. Both parents had dementia and were not taking their medications when thev should. Sadly, their father was ending up in hospital monthly due to missing his medications. After the adult daughter called me and we met at her parents' home, we set up our Daily Dispense, Pharmacy With

Care program and began

delivering and witnessing her parents taking their medication every day. The daughter told me that since then her father had NOT been hospitalized once during the past year! And her mother was in better general health as well.

Not only is the family thrilled that their parents are living in their home and enjoying their wellness in their senior years, but the family physician and the Home

> Health Case Manager are also relieved that we have helped to

provide a necessary service for their patients. This means that the aging couple gets to stay in their home and their medications are no longer a worry for their family and their physician. Home Health is also thrilled that we're providing an amazing service and saving money on many hospital visits."

FAMILY RESPITE CENTRE IMPROVEMENTS

The Family Respite Centre has been in its current location for over 10 years, during which time the building has seen many clients and families pass through its doors. This past year alone, 300 families benefited from this invaluable community

support; however, operating 365 days a year takes a toll on the buildings' facilities.

This month we have had the opportunity to enhance the walls of the centre. Gurdev Hayre, a pharmacist with The Medicine Shoppe, generously donated a painting which he purchased at our last

Questions about the flu? Nurse Wendy is here to answer!

Who should get the flu vaccine?

The National Advisory Committee on Immunization recommends that everyone over the age of 6 months get the flu vaccine. Vaccines are not given to children under 6 months of age; however, at Care BC's workplace flu clinics nurses only vaccinate family members 12 years and older.

How soon after I get the shot will I be protected against the flu?

Your body will begin to produce antibodies against the flu immediately, but it may take up to 7-14 days for the vaccine to fully protect you.

Our company is thinking of offering a flu clinic for the first time. How many employees usually sign up for a flu clinic?

When employers provide free flu immunization, approximately 30% of employees choose to be vaccinated.

We have just six employees at our Vancouver office and we do not want to pay for the minimum clinic cost of \$375.00. Is there an alternative?

Yes. You can still provide your employees with the benefit of the flu shot by coming to our office on Granville Street to get the shot. The employees can call Nurse Wendy at 604-733-9177 ext. 111 or email williamsw@carebc.ca to book an appointment.

I do not like needles. Is there any way to reduce my anxiety about needles?

Yes. We sell Intanza® flu vaccine which is given with a very tiny (1.5 mm) needle versus 25 mm (1 inch) for other flu vaccines.

Can I get the flu vaccine if I am pregnant?

Yes. The National Advisory Committee on Immunizations recommends that all pregnant women get the flu vaccine. We learned from the H1N1 flu pandemic that when pregnant women get the flu they are sicker than non-pregnant women and are more likely to be hospitalized. When a pregnant woman receives the flu vaccine, her baby will have some protection at birth as the flu vaccine cannot be given to children under 6 months of age.

Is there a different flu vaccine for pregnant women?

Health Canada approved the two vaccines we use for pregnant women. Sanofi Pasteur manufactures both our flu vaccines. Vaxigrip [®] is in a multi-dose vial and approved for people over the age of 6 months, and Intanza [®] is in a single-dose pre-loaded syringe. Our single-dose Intanza [®] vaccine has no preservative.

Why do some vaccines have a preservative?

When vaccines have more than one dose in the glass container (called a multi-dose vial) they need a preservative to maintain the quality of the vaccine once the vial has been opened. Vaccines that are sold in individual doses do not need a preservative. We offer both multi-dosed and single-dosed options.

If I am breast-feeding my child, can I still get the flu vaccine?

Yes, you can continue to breast feed and get your flu vaccine.

Can I get the flu vaccine if I have a head cold?

Yes. The British Columbia Centre for Disease Control says a minor, moderate or severe acute illness with or without fever is not a contradiction to immunization.
